
Spellings/Vocabulary

The book we are studying this term is Goodnight Mr Tom written by Michelle Magorian. A neglected child from a deprived home in London, Willie Beech is evacuated to the country during the Second World War to live with Tom Oakley, an old widower. With Tom,




Willie flourishes, develops friendships and finds real happiness and security for the first time. Then he has to return to London to his mother, and his old life experiences wait for him again there, only to worsen. This is an emotionally charged novel which explores themes such as safety and trust, parenting, fear and loss.

Overall aims:

- To engage children with a story with which they will empathise.
- To explore themes and issues, and develop and sustain ideas through discussion, enabling children to make connections with their own lives.
- To develop creative responses to the text through drama, storytelling and artwork.
- To compose poetry and write in role in order to explore and develop empathy for characters.

Mathematics

In term 2, we are focussing on different techniques for adding and subtracting, numbers up to 1,000,000 We'll also be continuing using our journals to really reinforce what we have learnt. Pupils will use the column method and counting on (number bonds).



Topic

In Term 2, the Year 5s will be learning about a Child's Experience of World War 2. We will examine the events leading up the outbreak of war, the countries involved and

their respective leaders. (NB Important dates of trips/events are overleaf.) In **Science**, we'll be learning to:

- observe how materials change from a solid to a liquid or a liquid to a gas
- •recognise solids, liquids and gases
- •group materials together using their properties
- •measure temperature and explore patterns in freezing and melting
- •find out what the 'water cycle' is.
- In **Music**, we'll be exploring
- War Time songs

In **Design and Technology**, we'll be exploring:

- War Time crafts, as part of the 'Make do and Mend' effort
- cooking and baking during rationing and evacuation
