SPaG Focus

- ☐ **Fronted adverbials** - A word (or a phrase for adverbial phrases) that is used for the same reason as an adverb, to modify a specific verb or clause.
- ☐ **Auxiliary verbs** - Verbs which form the tense, mood and voice of other verbs. They are also known as 'helping verbs'. The 3 most common auxiliary verbs are: 'be', 'have', 'do'. The modal verbs 'can', 'could', 'may', 'might', 'must', 'ought to', 'shall', 'should', 'will', 'would' are also included as auxiliary verbs.
- ☐ **Past tense** – A tense expressing an action that has happened or a state that previously existed.
- ☐ **Adjectives and expanded noun phrases** – Describing words and phrases that give more information about the noun in a sentence.

Genre Features – Newspaper report

- ☐ **Headline** – The short, snappy heading at the top of an article or page in a newspaper or magazine
- ☐ **Picture and caption** – Photographs with words printed underneath to explain and give more information.
- ☐ **Third person** – Writing which uses a narrator to relate the actions of the characters by referring to their names or by the third-person pronouns he, she, or they.
- ☐ **5W facts** – The *Who*, *What*, *Where*, *When* and *Why* of a newspaper story.

Vocabulary

Beret – A soft, round, flat cap, usually made of wool.

Boutique – A small shop selling fashionable clothes or accessories.

City – A large, busy town.

Contraption – A machine or device that appears strange or unnecessarily complicated, and often badly made or unsafe.

Gallery – A room or building for the display or sale of works of art.

Gasp – To catch one's breath with an open mouth due to pain or astonishment.

Mayor – an official elected or appointed to act as the head of a city, town, or borough.

Pigeon – A seed- or fruit-eating bird with a small head, short legs, and a cooing voice, typically having grey and white feathers and usually found in towns and cities.

Sculptures – Pieces of art made in 3D.

Skyscraper – A very tall building of many storeys found in a city.
